SUMMER SCRIPT

Summer Reflection by Kathy Platt

There is a song which we used to sing every week when I was in Explorers 1000 years ago. It went like this..."This is my Father's world, and to my listening ears, all nature sings and round me rings, the music of the spheres. This is my Father's world, I rest me in the thought, of rocks and trees, of skies and seas, his hand the wonders wrought." Amazing - those words are still embedded in my memory! Many things have changed in 1000 years - one of which is language. Where once I thought of the Creator exclusively as our Father, I now tend to think of our Creator as simply that - our Creator - our God. It is not an abandoning of tradition, nor is it a denial of the image of Father. For me, it is a recognition of an ever growing, ever changing, ever expanding way of expressing our faith. As we move into warmer days and into the lazy, hazy routines of summer living, another thing that will change is our way of "being church". In the village where I grew up in B.C., I used to play my guitar for the Catholic Church on a Saturday evening. In the summer, their congregation grew dramatically with the influx of all the summer tourists. Not quite the experience of most United Church congregations that I have been associated with! In the summer we often become a much smaller and more intimate gathering of the community. If we go back to the hymn I quoted at the beginning of this reflection, perhaps what we need to do is expand our definition of "church" - perhaps it is too confining to think that the only definition of church is what happens with the four walls of our building. A more expansive definition would be that the congregation is gathered under the wide open skies to listen to the singing of nature resting in the rocks and the trees and the other wonders wrought by the hand of God. What I hope is that as we experience the ebb and flow of the gathered community, that we will

remember our connection to one another – that we will hold each other in prayer – that we will pay attention to how our faith is lived out wherever it is that we happen to be spending our time. Happy summer – may we all sing a tune or two and give thanks for the gift of time and the gift of life itself!

<u>A Spiritual Retreat – Hiking in the Rockies</u> July 16 – 21, 2011

I came up with the idea for a "spiritual hiking retreat" based on a couple of ideas. I once heard Robert Bateman say that if everyone spent half an hour walking in the woods getting to know the names of 10 of our neighbours (trees, flowers, birds, fellow hikers...) many of our ailments which are caused by over-stressed living would be alleviated. The second idea comes from Barbara Brown Taylor who, in her book An Altar in the World, says: "in a world where faith is often construed as a way of thinking, bodily practices remind the willing that faith is a way of life." (p. xvi). And so, last year I asked Daniel Dumont if he would be willing to handle the expertise around the hiking part of the retreat, and I would offer the spiritual direction that would invite people to articulate their own experience of "living" their faith as we walked the mountains together. This is the second year we are offering the hike. Four of us are returning for our second experience, and two people are joining us for the first time. Quite a number of people have told me that the timing is not right for this year, but to keep them in mind for next year! I am very much looking forward to being immersed in the wonder of the mountains, and then to all of us bringing that experience back to share with the Sunset community. Another quote: "The miracle is not to walk on water but on the earth". (Thich Nhat Hanh). I am so glad that there are others who will walk the earth with me, open to exploring the miracle of life itself. Here are what some of the rest of our "holy hikers" have to say about why this is an important opportunity for them....

Andrew and Karen Cartmell: "There are two primary ways to know God – through the little book of Scripture and the big book of Creation", summarized our previous minister on Celtic Sunday a couple of years ago. Those words really resonated with me – that some people can get spiritual nourishment by reading the Bible, or listening to the minister's explanation of the Scripture readings each week, but that other people get equally nourished from different sources. The world is humming with the word of God – in the relationships we build with other people, in taking time to examine how God relates to our everyday lives, and in enjoying the beautiful world around us. We can feel God's presence in many different ways.

In our changing society, I think United Church ministers are doing a great job in reaching out to people – helping us find diverse ways to discuss our beliefs, make connections to each other, and find God in our everyday lives. In our previous church, we did this through a Listening For God book study group, choir, and Spirituality on Tap conversations.

After moving out to western Canada, Andrew and I are looking forward to exploring the Rocky Mountains with Kathy and the Spirituality Hiking group. We enjoy hiking narrow paths, scrambling over rock faces, sliding down scree slopes, discovering tiny alpine flowers, spying deer, and looking up at the stars in the vast sky. What a great way to experience God's creation!

<u>Daniel Dumont</u>: Why hiking? Most of the time, life is busy and complex; too busy, too complex ... Staying on the "Path" becomes difficult. I need my feet on the ground, my face in the rain, and I need to feel my sustaining breath. I need simplicity – I need wilderness. So I go and hike...

As I breathe the cool air of the mountain top and as I open my eyes wide, I begin to take in the world as God has created it. I notice what is being created, right here – right now, in front of me. I begin to feel my connections with this amazing world. And the more I feel, the more I believe...

I am in God's world... Thanks be to god!

Scott Thompson: Blessed be Your Mountain Top...

As this year's "Holy Hikers" are invited to "Stand on Top of a Mountain", I thought that I would take a moment and reflect upon last year's hike, particularly the spiritual connections I made. I clearly remember my first thought: Andrew and I spent many years living and hiking in BC and we missed that; now here was an opportunity to do so with church folk. How exciting! As we traversed the mountains, every day I experienced deeper relationships with Nature, God and our fellow church travellers. This year at Sunset has been greatly enhanced for me through the relationships that were strengthened with each other and with our church. On that hike, each day Kathy gently infused spiritual prayer and practice in amongst green branches of the forests and mountain vistas—just enough to make our days and our feet a little more intentional. We sang Hymns, we saw bears, we talked, we listened, we walked, we climbed, we fell down and we got back up. I look forward to hearing from this year's crew about your journey of church in Nature on mountain tops and valleys. (PS be prepared for snow!)

Ross Macnab and Janet McMurtry: Mountain hiking has been "church" for me for almost forty years; since that first trip to Waterton with a gang of teenagers from First United in Swift Current, led by Larry Edwards. I often say that my life, as I now know it, began with that trip to the mountains. Most certainly those hiking expeditions [I think there were eight] are a source of my deep connection with the United Church. So, I was thrilled last year that Kathy and Daniel agreed to take us to church in this special way.

Life on the hike is elemental: food, water, sleep, shelter, each other. And toilet paper, Janet would add. Everything else – those things that so define you back here – is irrelevant. Like worship, hiking is deeply contemplative. While the scenery is spectacular, you can't look at it all that much, or you'll go off the trail. You spend most of your time looking at your feet, the trail immediately in front of you and the butt of the person ahead of you. So you think and you feel and you breathe. Up there, with sky above, below and all around you and the world so suddenly

immense, you are focused on the pinprick of your own existence. And you have no grander purpose on this earth than to put one foot in front of the other. Then again. And again.

There is no expectation of membership – simply an invitation to be part of the conversation. So, these sessions will be open to anyone – long-time members, first-time members, and anyone else who would like to talk more about who we are as one congregation within this national denomination. Ministry & Personnel Committee News and Information

- 1) Sunday, May 8 was "Nora Atcheson Day" at Sunset. We honoured Nora, thanked her for her 6 years as our Office Coordinator, and wished her well in her retirement.
- 2) On Sunday, June 5 we will be honouring Russell as he observes 25 years in the ministry. Please join us for a short program and cake.
- 3) Sometimes there is confusion around our ministers' time away from the congregation. There are 2 reasons for them to be away:
- **Con Ed (Continuing Education)** The United Church of Canada mandates that a minister should take 3 weeks of Con Ed each year, including 3 Sundays.
- *Vacation time* Sunset had a policy of giving our Ministers 5 weeks of holidays each year. Russell and Kathy's salaries are the minimum amount that is mandated by the United Church of Canada. In an effort to compensate for this fact, a number of years ago, the Board increased their annual holiday time to 6 weeks. Of these 6 weeks, 4 are taken in the summer when Sunset is either closed or is very quiet. We feel that giving Russell and Kathy this extra week of holidays is a "perk" for them that has no financial impact on the congregation.

Every effort is made to have one of our ministers always here for Sunday worship and for providing pastoral care, but sometimes there are extenuating circumstances and situations that can't be avoided.

4) With Nora's retirement, work began a number of months ago to find a new Office Coordinator. The group that took on this task has advertised and interviewed twice. Each time we found a very suitable candidate and offered her the job. Unfortunately, both times the candidate, after accepting the job, turned it down. The hiring committee has decided to postpone repeating the process until late July, with hopes of having someone in the position for Sept. 1.

For June and July (the office is closed in August) office hours will usually be Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and Friday morning. However, this may not always be the case, so please call and check before coming. We hope that this will not cause inconvenience, and we appreciate your understanding.

We are so grateful to Bev Hui who has agreed to be our "interim" Office Coordinator. THANK YOU BEV!!!

I Believe in Miracles

We're familiar with the mantra of the T.V. evangelist who proclaims, "I believe in miracles!" and the words of a song that the pop charts once pumped out, "I believe in miracles, you sexy thing." Miracles – things that happen that you don't expect to happen. As a church, we're into making miracles happen and that's what happens when the work of the Mission and Service Fund is supported by folks like you and me.

Read the statistics. United Church congregations raised more than \$30 million dollars over the last year to support:

- The work of 124 indigenous churches, Christian Councils and agencies in more than 30 countries worldwide. That includes medical institutions, theological colleges, emergency relief, and the work of partners overseas on behalf of the poor and oppressed.
- We assisted global mission and ecumenical relations like the Ecumenical
 Accompaniment Program in Palestine and Israel(EAPPI), a World Council of Churches
 initiative that stands in solidarity with Palestinians who struggle to establish their own
 state and just relationships with Israel.
- As well, over 20 overseas personnel are supported. People like Faye Wakeling and her partner Peter Goldberger who some years ago served in Guatemala. They described a workshop for women in a remote village sponsored by the Mayan Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church of Guatemala, one of our partner churches. "The small church Service Fund kept filling and when we were ready to begin, there were 35 women, 10 men and 25 children, young people and babies ready to participate. We reflected on the creation story, the role of women as co-creators and the importance of their daily work in the families, churches and communities. We looked at Jesus' parable of a widow and the judge, identifying basic needs that are lacking in villages like schools and health services, latrines, and stoves in houses. The Gospel story brought us face to face with their need to organize to seek out the basic needs that must be met for their families to grow in health and strength."
- In Canada, M and S supports grants for youth ministry, ministries for community outreach and social support programs (like RA-PM), chaplains in hospitals and nursing homes and ministries giving support to refugees and new immigrants to Canada. In addition, your M and S givings support in some way more than 4000 ordained and diaconal ministers, candidates in ministry training and church schools.

The United Church sets as its goal to raise ever more funds for Mission and Service. The task begs a vision, a vision like that of Marie-Claude Manga, an immigrant from the Congo and a United Church member living in Montreal. She writes, "Imagine that we are like flowers in a big garden. If there are only tulips it's boring ... but imagine many different kinds of flowers, or tulips of different colours. Imagine, too, that each flower has its own structure, its own appearance and its own scent. Yet together they give out a rich and exquisite perfume. Then imagine many people with different ways of seeing and understanding things, yet working together as a team, sharing the same faith and the same hope."
